
UNCTAD assists developing, least developed countries, economies in transition, and regional organizations with trade facilitation reforms and measures, which includes:






National Trade Facilitation Committees all over the World

FOSTERING GENDER MAINSTREAMING IN NATIONAL TRADE FACILITATION COMMITTEES

Recent UNCTAD research shows that national trade facilitation committees are far from being gender balanced bodies. Most of these committees consider specific actions for gender mainstreaming in trade facilitation neither a priority nor relevant at this stage. There is a lack of awareness on the importance of gender mainstreaming in trade facilitation at national level. International agencies that support national trade facilitation committees could play a role to address this gap. For that to happen, national trade facilitation committees should place the gender issue on their agendas and, if necessary, request support on this specific subject from international partners.



National Trade Facilitation Committees (NTFCs) are consultative multi-stakeholder









= Results of UNCTAD support to National Trade = Facilitation Committees in 2016-2019

UNCTAD has been providing extensive support to National Trade Facilitation Committees (NTFCs) of 34 countries in 2016-2019. 26 countries from Africa, and 8 from Latin America and the Carribbean.









INCTAD EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMME for National Trade Facilitation Committees

UNCTAD provides an intensive professional programme for the secretariats and members of national trade facilitation committees (NTFCs). The main objective is to help them implement, in a coordinated manner, trade facilitation reforms, including the provisions of the Agreement on Trade Facilitation of the World Trade Organization. Successful committees and its members will be granted a completion certificate.

- Establishing an NTFC, if needed
- Improving teamwork dynamics within the NTFCs
- Launching a national roadmap for mainstreaming trade facilitation in development policy


In Central Africa





- enhanced revenue collection by 20%
- 70% of cargo released within 24 hours after submission of the customs declaration

• In **Angola**:


- Paper work for goods clearance reduced by 70%
- Customs clearance process accelerated; reduced from 30 steps to 7

• In Belize:

- Customs revenues increased by 39% in 2015 and 16% in 2016
- decrease in the overall customs intervention rate from 91% (2011) to 45% (2017)




Case Study: Rwanda



Rwanda Electronic Single Window (ReSW) began February 2011.

- Average clearance time
 Reduced from 11 days in
 2012 to 1.5 days in 2014.
- Export clearance was cut in half from 67 hours
 To 34 hours during same Period.

- 34 countries have participated in the Port Training Programme

- 1387 senior managers trained as trainers





are policy measures, other than ordinary customs tariffs, that can potentially have an economic effect on international trade in goods, changing quantities traded or prices or both.
